While several workers noted that the fear of employer retaliation or simply not wanting to take time off work to get medical treatment as the main reasons for not reporting, <u>the underlying reasons</u> were more far-reaching, including:

- Workers feel that injury is part of the job
- Workers did not want to lose out on safety incentives
- Workers did not want to be perceived as a "complainer" or "whiner"
- Workers found the workers' compensation process daunting
